Working 15 years for the City of Webster, Leon enjoys assisting the community in any maintenance issues that may arise.

"It's my responsibility to resolve any problems," says Leon, "There's always something that needs maintenance."

One of Leon's most prominent goals in his role is to be on the lookout for any potential damages inside and outside of building properties, assuring that everything is running smoothly before a work order is needed.

STORM DRAINS

Do you know where the water (& any debris) goes?

All water and contaminants that enter storm drains go directly into our environment.

Storm drain contamination is one of the major causes of pollution in our rivers, lakes, and streams. Pollution of stormwater runoff can negatively impact our environment and introduce unnecessary risk to public health and safety which ultimately affects the livability of the Clear Creek watershed and surrounding communities. To control stormwater, local cities and counties operate and maintain a system of underground pipes and catch basins to transport rain into rivers and streams. This water does not get treated, so we need to keep contaminants out of our storm drains.

Keep Webster clean! Please keep contaminants away from ALL storm drains.

Stormwater systems can be found throughout the City of Webster and include ditches, catch basins, curbs, underground pipes, ponds, swales, and dry wells. These structures carry stormwater to outfalls on local rivers or allow the stormwater to drain into the ground. Contaminants discharged into stormwater systems can pollute surface waters, as well as groundwater.

Keeping a clean water stormwater system helps our community by:

- Preventing flooding of personal property and/or damage to public infrastructure, including roads.
- Minimizing foul odors and maintaining aesthetically pleasing neighborhoods.
- Keeping rivers, lakes, and streams clean.
- Strengthening the local economy by offering healthy recreational opportunities.

STORM DRAINS DO NOT TREAT THE WATER THAT FLOWS INTO THE DRAINS.

RV and pet waste flow directly into our environment, causing foul odors and pollution. No one wants to swim and recreate in waste, including water creatures.



STORM DRAINS DO NOT PROTECT THE FISH, RIVERS, AND STREAMS.

Motor oil, paints, and other pollutants flow directly to our waterways. There is no difference between pouring pollutants down a storm drain and dumping them directly into the river.



STORM DRAINS DO NOT PREVENT FLOODING WHEN CLOGGED.

Storm drains are designed to prevent flooding. When weeds, dirt, grass clippings, and leaves are left on the road, they eventually find their way to the drain & can cause your personal property to flood.



PUBLIC STORM DRAINS ARE NOT DESIGNED TO TREAT WASTEWATER RUNOFF FROM PRIVATE PROPERTY.

When hosing off sidewalks, overwatering the yard, & washing your vehicle, all the water, soap, & debris end up in the storm drains. Not only are you wasting water resources, but all contaminants will affect the quality of water around Webster.



Tips to prevent debris and pollutants from entering our storm drains:

Beverly Gaines, Mayor Pro-Tem, ran unopposed for City Council Position 4 and was re-elected for a three-year term.


Edward Lapeyre, Council Member Position 5, ran unopposed and was re-elected for a three-year term.

PREPARE FOR HURRICANE SEASON

- Protect your past-personal records & special items
- Protect your present-buy flood insurance
- Protect your peace of mind-focus on planning & communications
- Protect yourself and others-NEVER drive on flooded roads
- Know if you live in a designated evacuation zone. Webster is in Zone B. Plan ahead for where you will go and when you will leave
- Learn how to shut off your utilities and know emergency numbers to call
- Protect your property, board up windows, secure outside furniture, boats, trailers, and other items
- Perform an inventory, and make copies of important insurance documents along with credit and ID cards. Make a video or take pictures of your property and belongings for insurance purposes
- Store important documents in a secure place away from home
- Keep some cash in a safe place that can easily be accessed during an evacuation



PREPARE A DISASTER SUPPLY KIT

- Have enough non-perishable food, water, and supplies for family and pets to last at least five days

PLAN FOR THOSE WITH FUNCTIONAL NEEDS

- Residents with disabilities, the critically ill, people without vehicles, or those who require medical support during an emergency should register for assistance with the State of Texas Emergency Registry (STEAR) by calling 2-1-1 or visiting tdem.texas.gov/stear

- Frequently monitor TV, radio, NOAA weather radio, internet, and hurricane helplines
- Fuel your vehicles and keep them topped-off

WOMEN IN ENGINEERING

With a little over two years since she began working as a consultant for the City of Webster, Katherine Mears is a delightful joy walking through Public Works every Wednesday.

As the City Engineer, Katherine attends predevelopment meetings in City Hall, where she speaks with developers who have an interest in constructing new buildings in Webster. CITY COUNCIL RECAP | APRIL 19 AND MAY 3 MEETINGS

April 19 Meeting

- The Webster Police Department received a re-accreditation from the Texas Police Chief's Association Accreditation Program.
- City Council authorized the issuance of a purchase order for seven Chevrolet Tahoe SUVs for the Police Department from Caldwell Country Chevrolet for \$528,445.00.
- City Council authorized the purchase of three vehicles for the Police Department from Cameron Dodge for \$90,525.00.
- City Council authorized an agreement with Motorola Solutions, Inc. for a new public safety software solution for the City of Webster's portion of the Gulf Regional Information Dispatch Consortium and ongoing software maintenance costs.
- City Council approved and authorized the Mayor to sign a contract with Harris County Election Division not to exceed \$8,379.40 for election services related to the May 7, 2022 election.

May 3 Meeting

- City Council approved an ordinance of the City of Webster, amending ordinance 09-08 personnel policy and revising the personnel policy manual by amending section 1.0 through

section 16.0.

- City Council approved a Resolution to deny the Distribution Cost Recovery Factor application proposed by CenterPoint.
- City Council approved to authorize a change order to Way Engineering, LTD. for additional work to replace water piping at the Police Department and City Hall for \$144,355.00.
